

WELCOME TO THE BEAULIEU RIVER & BUCKLER'S HARD YACHT HARBOUR



It has been in the custodianship of my family since 1538 when Henry VIII closed Beaulieu Abbey and sold its lands to my ancestor Thomas Wriothesley. The monks settled at Beaulieu partly because the river ensured easy transit between the abbey and points further afield, and so it remains today.

The estuary is an ideal place from which to sail in the Solent or to visit for a short stay and, if you seek the pleasures of the countryside, the Beaulieu Estate and the New Forest National Park are on your doorstep.

My aim is to maintain the natural beauty of the river and protect its wildlife and so the number of moorings is carefully controlled. The river offers 115 marina berths and over 300 moorings which are served by a seasonal water taxi. Buckler's Hard Yacht Harbour offers full marina services, including an open policy boatyard and chandlery. Along with a range of other benefits, permanent berth holders can take advantage of the Yacht Harbour's membership of the TransEurope group of marinas which provides reciprocal discounts when visiting over 70 partner marinas around the UK and Europe.

BY BOAT

The Beaulieu River is centrally located on the Solent. When approaching from the east, keep the lit south cardinal to starboard off Stone Point and steer to the vicinity of a lit, yellow special buoy close to the bearing to run in on. The bearing to run in on is 324° guided by the transit marks, the front mark is port post No. 2 and the back mark is the eastern edge of Lepe House.

The Buckler's Hard Yacht Harbour is a pleasant 3.5 nautical mile cruise upstream. Please report to the Harbour Master's Office on arrival using VHF channel 68 and call sign *Beaulieu River Radio*.

BY CAR


We are I4 miles from the M27 with easy access to the main south coast cities, the M3 and London. There is ample free parking for customers. Find us via satnav using SO42 7XB and enjoy your journey through the New Forest.

BY TRAIN

The closest main line railway station is eight miles away in Brockenhurst, with a regular service running between London Waterloo and Weymouth. A taxi from Brockenhurst to Buckler's Hard Yacht Harbour will take approximately 20 minutes.



The Beaulieu River team work hard to ensure all visitors and vessels remain safe when using the river. Please help us to achieve this by observing the following safety rules.

- Keep your speed below the maximum of 5 knots and ensure minimum wash for the entire length of the river.
- Keep to the starboard side of Fairway.
- Please don't jet-ski, water-ski or board sail on the river.
- 3 Anchoring is only allowed below Needs Ore.
- ♣ Please do not moor onto navigation buoys, beacons or marks.
- Underwater diving activities are not allowed without permission from the Harbour Master.
- If arriving from outside the UK with animals on board, you must have the correct paperwork from an authorised port of entry before using the river.

The marina is manned from 08:00-20:30 in summer and 08:00-16:30 in winter with security outside of these hours.

Please report any incidents or concerns to the Harbour Master's Office via VHF channel 68 **Beaulieu River Radio** or by calling 01590 616200. Out of hours call 999

- All commercial vessels, vessels over 20m, and vessels not under command, restricted in ability to manoeuvre, or towing another vessel or structure are requested to give notice of their movements by calling *Beaulieu River Radio* on VHF channel 68.
- In a man overboard situation, call for help and then try to assist but without putting yourself in danger. There are emergency ladders on all marina and river pontoons.
- To ensure their safety, please ensure children wear lifejackets and dogs are kept on leads at all times. Don't secure children or dogs to canoes or kayaks.
- 3 Take care on the pontoons when wet, frosty or icy.
- ## Have fun, but please don't endanger your life or others by operating your vessel whilst intoxicated.

Obviously, lots of people visit Beaulieu and the river in the summer months and it is a wonderful place for the family. Whether it's picnicking in the Forest, or barbecuing off the back of a boat on the river. But it's not just the summer—Beaulieu and the river are beautiful in every season. The trees may lose their leaves, and the wildlife may come and

go, but the river and the Forest maintain their peaceful beauty throughout the year.

We bought our house on the river several years ago. Although my wife was born in Southampton and spent many summers in the New Forest when she was a girl, neither of us really knew the area until we had a home here. Since then we have really got to know the area well, and now appreciate what a special place it is, and what a lovely community live in Beaulieu. They have all been so welcoming.

We are lucky to have some great pubs and restaurants in the area too, the closest being The Master Builder's at Bucklers Hard. Although it can be busy in the summer you can always get a table overlooking the river and marina for lunch or dinner. Another favourite on the river is the Southampton Yacht Club summer base at Gins Farm. Sitting out on their terrace with a cold beer as the sun goes down is a real treat, and I don't think you even need to be a member.

Enjoy Beaulieu, enjoy the river, and let's maintain its beauty and charm so we can all chill out from the mad world around us.

Staying on the Beaulieu River provides the perfect opportunity to hop ashore and explore the New Forest. Here are some suggestions of how you could spend a couple of hours or days.

PLACES TO VISIT

Explore the historic village of **Buckler's Hard**, just a short stroll from the marina. The Maritime Museum and historic cottages tell the story of the village and its important role in 18th century shipbuilding.

Just over two miles up-river is the village of **Beaulieu**, and home of the Beaulieu visitor attraction featuring the National Motor Museum, Palace House, Beaulieu Abbey and World of Top Gear. Beaulieu River visitors receive 20% off admission to both attractions—see over for further details.

Further afield, the New Forest villages of Brockenhurst, Lyndhurst, Burley and Lymington are within a 30 minute drive of Buckler's Hard, providing the opportunity to explore shops, cafes and restaurants.

WALKING

The New Forest is popular with walkers and has a variety of footpaths and routes to suit all abilities. For further information visit thenewforest.co.uk

CYCLING

Bicycles can be hired from the Harbour Office.
Off-road cycling in the New Forest is permitted on a waymarked network of Forestry Commission tracks. A map of authorised routes can be downloaded from newforestnpa.gov.uk

BFACH DAYS

Lepe Country Park and Calshot are good spots to sit on the beach and watch the busy Solent, or within 45 minutes by car you can be sat on the sandy beach at Mudeford. The New Forest Beach Bus runs between Hythe and Lymington, stopping at Buckler's Hard, during August. See thebeachbus.info for details.

EAT & DRINK

The Captain's Cabin Tea Rooms at the top of Buckler's Hard High Street serves hot and cold refreshments, including afternoon tea. The Master Builder's House Hotel offers casual and fine dining options and is situated within a five minute walk of the marina. Alternatively a leisurely 2 ½ mile stroll into Beaulieu will provide further places to eat from cosy cafes and pubs to award winning restaurants.

BEAULIEU EVENTS: YEAR ROUND

At the heart of the Beaulieu River is Buckler's Hard, an 18th century village where ships were once built for Nelson's Navy.

Originally named 'Montagu Town' by John, 2nd Duke of Montagu, Buckler's Hard developed into a hive of shipbuilding activity in the late 1700s. With New Forest oak on the doorstep, it was ideally situated for such a task. The cottages that line the unusually wide street – where logs and planks were once piled – housed tradesmen and labourers.

Shipbuilding here went into decline shortly after the Napoleonic wars, but the village has remained unspoilt by the passage of time. In the Maritime Museum you will discover the fascinating story of the village, its residents and the ships they built, including Nelson's favourite warship HMS Agamemnon. Listen in to conversations between villagers of the past in the 18th century New Inn and follow the stories of the 19th and 20th century residents in an exhibition about village life.

Step through the doors of a worker's cottage as you go back in time to the 18th century to find out about the home life of the villagers and their families in historic cottage displays. One building, once the village school, is now a chapel which still holds regular

services. Recent excavations of its cellar have suggested that the building may have been used by smugglers.

To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the sinking of the SS Persia, a memorial sundial and new artefacts can now been seen at the Buckler's Hard Maritime Museum.

Just two miles upstream from Buckler's Hard Yacht Harbour is the village of Beaulieu, the family seat of the Montagu family and the location of the world famous National Motor Museum.

The National Motor Museum, with over 250 vehicles in its collection, tells the story of motoring on the roads and circuits of Britain from pioneering origins to the present day. From the earliest motor carriages to classic family saloons, displays include historic sporting motors, motorcycles, Formula One racers and a rustic 1930s country garage. New for 2018 is *The Luxury of Motoring*, a brand new display exploring the golden age of luxury motoring including a collection of 28 Lalique glass car mascots.

After the motor museum, you can stroll through the gardens to Palace House, home to the Montagu family. Once the Great Gatehouse to Beaulieu Abbey, the house has been in the Montagu family's ownership since 1538. You will be greeted by Victorian costumed staff and then welcome to explore the house at your own pace. If you're lucky, there'll be a smell of cooking wafting through the house from the 19th century kitchen where the cook still bakes bread in the coal fired range.


Not far from Palace House are the remains of Beaulieu Abbey. Founded by King John in 1204, the conserved ruins of this once vast medieval abbey are an excellent place to relax and even enjoy a period of quiet contemplation. You can also learn much about the abbey's history in the Abbey Exhibition and view a fascinating series of embroideries by Belinda Lady Montagu which illustrate key events in the abbey's history.

Other attractions include the updated *World of Top Gear* which recreates the feel of the TV studio, complemented by a tongue-in-cheek display of the cars modified for the challenges seen on our screens. The Secret Army Exhibition reveals the story behind Beaulieu's covert wartime role as a 'finishing school' for secret agents. Visitors can also ride the high level Monorail which circles the site and offers informative commentary and sweeping views of the park and gardens.

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WALKING FROM BEAULIEU TO BUCKLER'S HARD



3 Riverside Walk

This alternative route gives closer views over the river, all of which is a designated National Nature Reserve. The flat area you see is known as a 'salting'. Grass species such as Spartina have helped to stabilise the mud banks over time. The path passes some small creeks notable for plumed reeds, especially the Yellow Flag Iris in summer. Also look for Sea Lavender, Cord Grass and Sea Purslane.

4 Burnt Oak Copse

The trees here are predominantly Oak dating from the early 19th century. Later these were supplemented by Wild Service, Hazel, Scots Pine and Beech with Common Privet, Butcher's Broom, Holly and Hawthorn, providing shelter and food for game birds. Note the stunted tree growth at the river's edge, caused by poor drainage and the salt water from the river.

5 Keeping Marsh

An open expanse of various salt tolerant plants. This mud bank is the holding area for dredgings from the river but is quickly being colonised by indigenous plant and animal life, notably Shellduck, Canada Geese, Mallard, Oystercatchers, Redshank and Curlew. A public bird hide is also located here, accessible from the footpath and suitable for wheelchair users.

6 Beaulieu River Boatyard

Hub of boating activity on the river of today.

7 Duke's Bath House

This small thatched cottage was built by George, Duke of Montagu, c1760 for his son who suffered from arthritis. Salt water was considered beneficial for sufferers of arthritis so a pond in the garden was filled with river water, in which people could bathe.

I Gilbury Pier connecting to the Exbury Estate.

2 Mulberry Dock

This is the site of the old oyster beds created in the 1870s. During the Second World War, an experimental floating dock was built here, together with components for the Mulberry

Harbour, used in the D-Day landings. Today, oysters are again being bred on the river, where the water is pure enough for a licence to be granted.

In the 18th century, this was an anchoring point for the hulls of

3 Fiddler's Reach

newly launched ships en route for Portsmouth. The grass that covers the mudflats along the river is called Spartina Townsendii. This first appeared on the river in the 1870s to help bind the mud flats, thus reducing erosion. A second variety,

Spartina Anglicana, was

introduced in 1898.

4 Gins

Marina

This was where the monks of Beaulieu Abbey kept their fishing boats and trading ships. It was a convenient place to load and unload without having to navigate the narrower channel upstream. The name 'Gins' is thought to derive from 'ingenium', a lifting or winding mechanism used to move the load. Today, Gins is a base for the Royal Southampton Yacht Club. An oil pipeline from Wytch Farm near Poole to Fawley Oil Refinery passes under the river at this point.

Buckler's Hard

5 Sea Banks

The land behind these banks was reclaimed in the 18th century and used for salt production. Salt was a highly prized commodity and Salt Officers were based in Buckler's Hard to check that the quantity of salt produced tallied with the amount of tax paid. 200 years later, the banks remain intact, but they do not hold out the highest tides, and the meadows behind are periodically flooded. This provides waterfowl, particularly Brent Geese and Wigeon, with feeding areas in autumn and winter.

6 Needs Ore Coastguard Cottages

Built in the 1860s for the Coastguard, who were at the forefront of the fight against smuggling, as well as defence and rescue. Officers were moved around from station to station to prevent them becoming established in the local community and susceptible to bribery and collusion. The Needs Ore Station closed in 1922 but the cottages continue to be occupied by tenants of the estate.

7 Needs Ore Point


This was where Charles Bull created his 'Bull's Run' in 1726–27 as a shortcut into the river from the Solent. It was closed by a Special Act of Parliament in 1986 to protect Gull Island from erosion. Needs Ore is the base of the Beaulieu River Sailing Club whose dinghy races take place in this part of the river.

8 Gull Island

This is actually a spit and owes its name to the Black-Headed Gulls which used to nest here in abundance, and after a period of time away are now nesting again. This forms part of the Special Protection Area (SPA) and is out of bounds to public.

9 Millennium Beacon

This miniature lighthouse serves as a day mark and contains a sectored light for guiding boats into the river at night. Its construction was kindly funded by many of the yachtsmen who use these waters.






Drifting up the Beaulieu River at the top of the tide late on a summer's evening, if you listen, you may realise that the crew and you are not alone.

Down at the entrance, a white coastguard cottage lines up with a distinctive boat house on the foreshore to remind us that, just beyond living memory, the best water on the bar lay due south of the dolphin marker. This transit has long since been superseded. So has the old slatted board someone hung in the trees east of Lepe House marking a better line. The bar has moved yet again, but the respect for history that lies at the heart of the Beaulieu experience insists that the bright paint initiated by men long gone is maintained.

Over the bar, past Needs Ore, through the meadows where the curlews call, Gins Farm lies beside the outstation of the Royal Southampton Yacht Club where my daughter celebrated her wedding and where I have passed many a convivial evening. Inside, all is warmth and friendship, but if you pop out for a breath of air towards closing time, a sense of the past gathers you in with the mist off the water. Just down the lane stands the monumental East gable of what, in its day, was probably the largest tithe barn in Britain. Built by the Cistercian monks of Beaulieu Abbey on land gifted to them by King John, in its medieval heyday it was a hive of activity as villagers and landowners alike brought one tenth of their annual produce to support the abbey. What day-to-day thoughts filled the head of a Cistercian monk? And how did the villeins feel about handing over their pig, or their bushel of hard-won wheat? They were born here, they loved, they hoped and they laboured until they dropped, leaving us only the great wall of their barn, the remains of an ancient wharf and the sure knowledge that they trod these banks before us.

Further up through the oak woods, a creek disappears into the west bank by an upturned boat sheltering a seat. This is Clobb Copse, dredged in 1943 so concrete vessels could be constructed. In 1944 it was extended to produce barges for Churchill's Mulberry Harbour at Arromanches, the artificial haven which kept allied supply lines open soon after D-Day. In my lifetime, people who worked here still lived on Beaulieu Estate. Now they too are gone, but their spirit speaks to us as we cruise by.

At Bucklers Hard, the glory days of Nelson's Navy are all around us. The lists of fighting ships, built here on slipways where families now picnic, are posted in the cottage chapel and on the pub wall. Agamemnon, Nelson's sweet-sailing 64-gun ship ran down these ways in 1781 to cheers and cap-waving from the men whose labour had created her. Spare them a thought, as I do, those craftsmen whose cooking fires burned in the grates of the same red-brick cottages we see today. Their names have been swept away on the spring tide of time, but their ship took the surrender of the Santissima Trinidad at the Battle of Trafalgar when the nation's freedom and prosperity were finally secured.

2018 is our own age. We who keep our boats here, those working on the water and every visitor with an ear to hear, leaves a shade behind for generations yet unknown. Who can say what boats they will bring or what their business will be, but come they surely will, for history never stops unravelling and Beaulieu is a very special place.


Photographing the Beaulieu River

For the last 16 years, the Beaulieu River has been one of my favourite photographic locations in the New Forest. There are a wide variety of things to see throughout the year in all kinds of weather. My preference is for a calm dawn with interesting clouds reflected in the mirrored surface of the river. With rising mist, it's even better!

Beaulieu village and Buckler's Hard offer many viewpoint possibilities, both having excellent access. Walking along the footpath between them gives many other vantage points. Getting out on a boat increases your options still further. The photograph below is from a memorable colourful October dawn at Bailey's Hard. This is exactly how the sheet of transparency film looks, it is not a computer creation! The dawn sky colour has enhanced the appearance of the brown shoreline mud and concrete slipway.

Having a camera with you can raise appreciation of your surroundings. I find it pays to observe closely, less is often more when deciding what to include in the picture, try moving left/right/up/down to reveal/conceal things to improve the picture. Wait to choose the right moment to press the shutter. Not quite as simple as blinking—but far more rewarding!
